3	All	<b>Leverhulme Research Fellowships</b> offering up to £50,000 over three to twenty-four months for experienced researchers to conduct a

4	All	<p><b>Leverhulme Research Project Grants.</b> Offering up to £500,000 over five years for research on a topic of the applicant's choice. Grants cover salary and research costs directly associated with the project. Submit a first-stage outline application at any time. Institutions eligible to apply are universities, other institutions of higher education in the UK, and registered charities in the UK which have research capacity equivalent in standing to that of a UK university. 5	Creative Partner/All	<p><b>Leverhulme Artist in Residence.</b> Offering up to £15,000 for UK universities and museums to foster a completely new creative collaboration with an artist working in a discipline outside the applicant institution's usual curriculum. Apply after 1 April and by 18 August 2016. An artist may not apply directly – all applications must be made by the host institution.</p> <p>These awards support the residency of an individual artist in a UK university or museum in order to foster a creative collaboration between the artist and the staff and/or students of that institution. 6	DML	<p><b>The Spencer Foundation</b> invites proposals for its new civics small grant programme. This aims to support research that asks critical questions about how education can more effectively contribute to the civic development of young people. The foundation has a particular interest in studies that attend to the following: powerful motivations and psychological influences; enabling learning experiences and environments; societal or group norms, political processes or events, historical and cultural trends and other contextual influences. 7	All	<p><b>ESRC Research Grants open call.</b> There is considerable flexibility when it comes to subject area, too. As long as you always make sure that your suggested topic falls within ESRC's remit, you are free to concentrate on any research area. You can submit applications to the scheme at any time - there are no fixed closing dates. Awards rang from £350,000 to £1 million (100 per cent full Economic Cost (fEC) and this can be</p>

8	ECR	<p><b>Leverhulme Trust Early Career Fellowships.</b> These aim to provide career development opportunities for those who are at a relatively early stage of their academic careers. Approximately 100 Fellowships will be available in 2016. Fellowships can be held at universities or at other institutions of higher education in the UK. The Trust will contribute 50% of each Fellow's total salary costs up to a maximum of £24,000 per annum and the balance is to be paid by the host institution. 9	All	<p><b>BA/Leverhulme Small Research Grants.</b> Grants are available to support primary research in the humanities and social sciences. The first recourse for funding should be to your own institution (where applicable). Applications will not be considered for less than £500. The maximum grant is £10,000 over two years. 10	All	<p><b>British Academy Mid-Career Fellowships.</b> The aim of the scheme is to allow successful applicants to obtain time freed from normal teaching and administrative commitments. These Fellowships are awards to individuals employed at UK universities or other UK institutions of higher education, and the Academy is looking particularly to support mid-career scholars. The Academy's contribution to the salary of the Mid-Career Fellow will be capped at an upper limit of £80,000. Capacity-building projects can be: joint projects, aimed at producing outcomes that benefit principally and directly the organisations from eligible partner; countries involved in the project; structural projects, aimed at producing an impact on higher education systems and promoting reforms at national or regional level in the eligible partner countries. 14	MDL / Education Dynamics	<p><b>The Nuffield Foundation</b> invites applications for its grants for research and innovation. These support research, practical experiments or development work in the following areas: children and families, early years education and childcare, education, etc. Grants normally range from £10,000 to £350,000, although the majority are worth between £50,000 and £200,000. Funding usually supports projects for a duration of under four years.</p> <p><b>Deadline for outline applications: 23 March 2016</b></p>
15	EU/Global Research Partners/All.	<p><b>Marie Skłodowska-Curie Fellowships.</b> There are two types of Individual Fellowships:</p>

		<p>1. European Fellowships: Held in the EU or associated countries; Open to researchers either coming to Europe or moving within Europe; Can help to restart research careers after a break such as parental leave; Can also help reintegrate researchers coming back to Europe.</p> <p>2. Global Fellowships: Fund secondments outside Europe for researchers based in the EU or associated countries; There is a mandatory one-year return period; European and Global Fellowships can also include a secondment period of up to 3 or 6 months in another organisation in Europe, where this would boost the impact of the fellowship.</p> <p><b>Anticipated Deadline: End of August 2016.</b></p>
16	All	<p><b>Education Endowment Foundation.</b> The Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) exists to fund the development and evaluation of cost-effective and replicable projects that seek to improve the educational attainment of pupils who are eligible for free school meals. They are currently interested in evidence-based ideas that focus on the following issues:</p> <p>Early years, including early language development, self-regulation, parental engagement/home learning, and professional development in early years settings;</p> <p>Interventions aimed at improving literacy outcomes in primary school children, that could be tested in schools in the North East.</p> <p>Secondary school subject teaching. We receive relatively few applications about improving subject-specific teaching and attainment in secondary schools.</p> <p><b>Deadline: 1<sup>st</sup> April 2016.</b></p>

18	All	<p><b>Arts &amp; Humanities Research Council Research Networking.</b> The Research Networking Scheme is intended to support forums for the discussion and exchange of ideas on a specified thematic area, issue or problem. The intention is to facilitate interactions between researchers and stakeholders through, for example, a short-term series of workshops, seminars, networking activities or other events. The aim of these activities is to stimulate new debate across boundaries, for example, disciplinary, conceptual, theoretical, methodological, and/or international. Proposals should explore new areas, be multi-institutional and can include creative or innovative approaches or entrepreneurship.
