

OPPORTUNITY FOR PLACEMENT FELLOWSHIP IN THE WELSH GOVERNMENT

As part of its Placement Fellowship Scheme the ESRC welcomes applications from academics interested in working in a research capacity in the Welsh Government. The Scheme encourages social science researchers to spend time within a partner organisation to undertake policy relevant research and to develop the research skills of partner employees. The Fellowship will be jointly funded by the ESRC and the Welsh Government while the Fellow remains employed by his/her institution.

Project Title

SIMWales: Maximising the Use of Existing Administrative and Survey Data Sets for Wales

The project is one of a programme of four fellowships aimed at maximising the use of existing survey and administrative data sources for Wales.

Length of Fellowship

It is envisaged that the fellowship would be for a period of 12 months on a full time basis. Applications for candidates interesting in working part time or as part of a job share would also be considered.

Proposed start date

To be agreed with a successful applicant.

Location of Fellowship

The Welsh Government, Cathays Park, Cardiff but with some travel within Wales/UK. In particular, frequent travel will be required to our partner organisation, the Health Information Research Unit (HIRU), Swansea University.

Project objective

The project will connect to existing proposals to develop a 100% sample Wales Longitudinal Study (WLS) and represents a development stage for this work. The fellow would undertake work to develop a WLS, allowing the census to be used as a template to which:

- administrative records would be linked; and
- records for the major Wales household surveys collected since 2001 would be statistically matched in order to create a Simulated Population of Wales for research purposes.

A key aspect of the work is to develop methods to undertake and validate the statistical matching of retrospective anonymised survey data sets to administrative sources. If the SIMWales proposal is feasible and time allows, one or more short pieces of analysis relating to priority policy questions could be undertaken in order to demonstrate the

utility of SIMWales.

An additional objective that cuts across the suite of four fellowships is to identify any added value that can be gained for key survey and administrative data sources for Wales, whether through data linking, improving access or any related field.

Project tasks

The Fellow would work closely throughout with WG Policy and Knowledge and Analytical Services (KAS) officials and key stakeholders as well as the three other programme Fellows, HIRU, the NCRM and other relevant expert bodies and networks.

The project is cutting edge for the UK (although not for Switzerland or Scandinavia) and this means that the viability of creating a 100% WLS and, beyond that, SIMWales is relatively unpredictable. The Fellow will be required to negotiate numerous organisational and data handling sensitivities, making it difficult to predict how far along the overall programme trajectory this individual project will be able to progress. Should the creation of both the WLS and SIMWales prove to be viable, the key tasks and deliverables as listed below are envisaged to be achievable. However, where issues arise either to delay the project or prove aspects of it to be unworkable, the tasks would inevitably shift focus to documenting the process and the reasons for any delay / unfeasibility and to proposing alternative ways of meeting the overall programme objective of maximising the use of existing data sources for Wales.

Key Task

- Undertake the tasks required to develop a 100% sample WLS. This would include identifying, documenting and taking into account ethical, legal, data protection and information security requirements for example, where a linked data set is considered 'new data', the project must adhere to the ESRC's Data Policy. The Fellow will work closely with the Data Access Fellow in undertaking this task.
- Build on existing HIRU processes to propose a procedure by which researchers can be provided with the ability to analyse data sets created using the WLS as a template to link additional administrative data sets held by HIRU.
- Develop and validate microsimulation methods to allow the 'WLS + Admin' to be used as a template to simulate, by statistically matching retrospective anonymised WG-sponsored social survey data (e.g. Welsh Health Survey, Living in Wales survey), a population of Wales for research purposes. Different techniques may be suitable for different topics or levels of geographical aggregation; it is therefore essential that the best methods for a variety of policy-relevant purposes are proposed. Since the validation of these models is central to ensuring their applicability, the identification and utilisation of suitable validation techniques will be an essential component of the project.
- If SIMWales is demonstrated to be a feasible propose and test a flexible, swift process for KAS Relationship Managers to request analysis as part of Rapid Evidence Assessments.
- A report documenting the development of the SIMWales Project and assessing its viability as a research resource both for policy-related rapid evidence assessments and for the wider research community.
- If sufficient time remains, identify one or more short demonstration projects to assess the extent to which the resulting "SIMWales" process is a valuable, sufficiently functional research tool.

Key Deliverable

- A Wales Longitudinal Study.
- Any data sharing protocols required for the creation of a WLS.
- A procedure in place for researchers to access 'WLS + admin' data sets.
- A procedure in place for researchers to access 'SIMWales'.
- A Rapid Evidence Assessment process to allow WG analysts to access SIMWales data swiftly and flexibly.
- A SIMWales Report, including chapters on ethical, legal, DP and IS issues, simulation and validation techniques.
- A short key findings report for each demonstration project.

In addition, the Fellow would feed into:

- the updating of an existing WG audit of detailed survey and administrative data sources for Wales, including data release policies and practices (see Data Access Fellowship);
- the identification of additional Wales survey data sets for future matching (see Data Access Fellowship);
- a report outlining options for improving secure access to small area data for Wales (see Data Access Fellowship);
- work underway within the Welsh Assembly Government Social Research Division to develop and validate 'consent to link' methods to secure consent from prospective survey respondents for key WG-sponsored household surveys.

Skills required

Specialist skills

- Experience of manipulating large scale data sets (administrative or social survey but ideally both);
- Ideally, significant experience of working with the Longitudinal Study, Census or other large administrative data sets;
- A strong background in social survey methodology (not necessarily specific to data linking as this is a relatively new area of work and the fellowship will develop this);
- A basic familiarity with methods of data linking, statistical matching, simulation and/or modelling;
- Experience of developing and applying validation techniques;
- Experience in undertaking multivariate analysis on large scale data sets (administrative or social survey but ideally both);
- Since the majority of the existing data sources are health-related, the fellowship may suit a candidate with an interest in health research, although since this project is strongly methodological in focus, this is certainly not a necessary requirement.

Other skills

• The ability to communicate findings to a lay (policymaking) audience both in writing and verbally.

Background

There has been a drive by government to make better, and more widespread, use of the rich and plentiful data sources that it holds. Some of the greatest potential lies in improving access to potentially disclosive micro-data from survey or administrative sources. In maintaining the anonymity of data, geographical detail is often suppressed. Access to potentially disclosive data can therefore facilitate small area analysis. However,

the potential benefits extend further and include providing mechanisms for linking data sets and the ability to flexibly create new variables for secondary analysis. The push to maximise the use of existing data sources is particularly important at this time when budgets for primary data collections are severely constrained and the public survey burden remains a concern. There is a need to maximise the benefits of existing sources of survey and administrative data. Both access and data linking must to be achieved in a controlled and secure manner, taking into account ethical and legal considerations and the purposes for which data have been collected

Whilst there are a number of potential sources of detailed data for Wales, they have their limitations. The Secure Anonymised Information Linkage (SAIL) Project, based at the Health Information Research Unit (HIRU) at Swansea University, already links together a range of administrative and clinical data sources using the School of Medicine's IBM supercomputer. It has made important progress in data anonymisation, acquisition, linkage, quality management and analysis. However, the focus has largely been on linking administrative health data sets, although more recently other administrative sources have been included (for example, the Pupil Level Annual School Census data). SAIL recognises the considerable scope there is to make further use of the data, including linking to survey data.

While the Data Linking Fellowship aims to maximise the use of *linked* administrative data (records for the same individual held in different data sets are linked using personal information e.g. date of birth, NHS number), this Fellowship aims to maximise the use of retrospective, anonymised survey data through *statistical matching* (survey records for an anonymous individual are statistically matched to the most similar individual within an administrative template e.g. the census).

Since 2001, the Wales Labour Force Survey Boost, Welsh Health Survey (WHS) and Living in Wales survey (LiW) have, between them, surveyed close to 12% of the population of Wales (or over 300,000 individuals). Value can be added to these data by using probabilistic statistical techniques to 'match' them to data sets within SAIL. The matching is achieved by identifying the anonymised survey case that is the closest match (based on a variety of characteristics e.g. age, gender, location) to an administrative case for which data are held by NHS Wales Information Service (NWIS). Data from both sources can be combined, creating a new data set.

Two kinds of outputs tend to be created using these methods:

- Using survey data as a template, admin data can be matched in and the survey data set analysed simply including the additional information;
- Using the administrative data set as a template, the closest match from survey data sets can be matched in to create a simulated data set of the same magnitude as the administrative set but including the full richness of the survey data.

WG are currently validating a simulation project that involves using the Wales Labour Force Survey (LFS) Boost as a template and matching cases from the Wales sample of the Family Resources Survey (FRS). This is designed to allow estimates of variables, e.g. levels of poverty, to be made to smaller geographical areas than could be provided using the FRS sample in Wales (even if this was boosted significantly). Building on this - and representing the greatest research potential - would be for the Fellow to link their work to the proposal to develop a 100% sample Wales Longitudinal Study (WLS). The key issue in connecting to the WLS is the potential to use the census to provide the template against which to statistically match records rather than a survey like the LFS, massively increasing the size and detail of the simulation from a simulated LFS population to a simulated Wales population (SIMWales).

The fellow would begin by seeking to create a Wales Longitudinal Study. Additional administrative data sets would then be linked to the census in order to maximise the administrative information available about individuals. This use of 100% of census records as a template for linking other administrative sources for research purposes is already undertaken in several other countries including, for example, Switzerland (<u>www.swissnationalcohort.ch</u>). In addition to the creation of linked administrative data sets to a census template, the project would develop methods for the statistical matching of retrospective anonymised survey data to the census and administrative data template in order to create a simulated population of Wales. If it proves feasible and if time allows, the fellow will undertake work to create and validate SIMWales, making proposals for how the database could be made available to WG analysts in order to feed into Rapid Evidence Assessments.

If time allows and in order to demonstrate the potential matched and simulated administrative data has to answer important policy questions, the project will identify one or more high priority research questions to which WG requires answers in order to support its policymaking. These proposals will be developed by the Fellow in consultation with WG, analysis completed and the findings disseminated in order to demonstrate the feasibility of the SIMWales proposal. The extent to which time will be available to the fellow to complete these projects will depend on the extent to which SIMWales is proven to be feasible and the timescales required to develop it.

The demonstration projects will be specified in detail in consultation with both HIRU and WAG as part of the initial stages of the project. However, a potential demonstration project for which a strong policy requirement have already been identified is:

- to estimate levels of fuel poverty in Wales by using the Census as template to match Living in Wales house condition survey data.
- One possible demonstration project with a strong policy driver would be to produce small area estimates of the number of BME individuals in Wales.

The fellow would feed into the work of the Data Access Fellow to identify any added value that can be gained for key survey and administrative data sources for Wales, whether through data linking, improving access or any related field.

It would be important for external stakeholders (including the HE sector in Wales) to have input into the project via a steering group.

All applications under this scheme must be made through the Research Council's Joint Electronic Submissions (Je-S) process. You must have a Je-S account to gain access to

Before creating your application

In other words, there is a further layer of administration between your submission of the application and the application being submitted to the ESRC, via Je-S. This Research Organisation's submission route usually includes both an approver (ie Head of Department) and submitter pool (ie central finance office) and the ESRC cannot accept responsibility for any delay which may occur as a consequence. Je-S Registration

2.10 Edit Estates and Indirect Costs

2.15.1 Case for Support

If the research involves data collection or acquisition you must demonstrate that you have carried out a datasets review, and explicitly state why currently available datasets are inadequate for the proposed research.

Where possible describe the potential impact of the Fellowship on policy or practice.

2.15.2 Justification of Resources

It is only necessary to justify Travel & Subsistence costs claimed, so a statement of maximum of 2-sides of A4 setting out these costs should be submitted. The Scheme allows for Travel & Subsistence costs of up to a maximum of f_{c} 6k over the duration of the Fellowship.

2.15.3 Pathways to Impact - Maximum of 2 sides of A4

The Pathways to Impact is your opportunity to describe how the potential impacts of this Fellowship will be realised. This is specific to users and beneficiaries of the Fellowship who are outside of the academic research community, for example the public sector, commercial private sector, third sector or the wider public in general.

In describing plans to maximise impact, applicants should consider what is achievable and expected for a Fellowship of this nature. If your work is oriented towards academic beneficiaries only, then you should state that a Pathways to Impact Plan is "not applicable" and briefly set out the reasoning behind this. 2.15.3 CV

A CV for the applicant must be included. This should include contact details, qualifications (including class and subject), academic and professional posts held since graduation, a list of the most relevant and recent publications, and a record of research funded by the ESRC and other bodies. This should not exceed two A4 sides.

2.15.4 List of Publications

The bibliography for references cited in the proposal should be attached.

2.15.5 Head of Department Statement

The Applicant's Head of Department should complete a statement in support of the application. The statement should confirm that the Applicant will be released from university duties for the duration of the Fellowship.

2.16 Additional document actions

After all expected sections have been completed, you can select **Validate document** which will indicate (below the Je-S document menu) any missing mandatory or incomplete sections that need to be addressed.

Once the proposal has been successfully validated, select **Submit document** from Document Menu. Strategic Priorities

These challenges build on existing research, help consolidate knowledge but also recognise emerging key areas for social science. You must consider if your research project falls within one or more of ESRC's Strategic Challenges

Applicants should note that no funds are 'ring fenced' for these Strategic Challenge areas and applications that fall outside of these areas will not be disadvantaged. The only criteria for funding will be the overall scientific quality of the application and its potential for high scientific and/or user impact.

User Involvement

If 'Users' have been/will be engaged with your research project, please specify the nature of their engagement. Users' are those individuals, groups or organisations who have an interest in or may benefit from the research. 'Users' may be from the public sector, commercial private sector, third sector or the wider public in general. Engaging 'Users' in your research from its conception and development through to the dissemination stage is likely to increase the impacts achieved.

3. Tracking proposal

Once you have selected **Submit document** the proposal will be processed through your internal organisation's approver/submitter pool.

To enable you to determine when your proposal has been formally submitted to council via Je-S (and therefore whether a call deadline was met) this can be tracked through the 'View Submission Path' and 'Document History' links in the Document Menu of your proposal, via the Management section on the right hand side of the screen.

ESRC PLACEMENT FELLOWS SCHEME – FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q. Is this scheme operating within Full Economic Costing?

A. No. The scheme is currently outside of the FEC rules but applications MUST be made through the JeS.

Q. Will the ESRC pay the researchers' salary costs?

A. The ESRC and the partner organisation will share the total salary and NI/Superannuation costs plus any agreed travel and accommodation.

Q. What costs are 'eligible' for claiming other than salary?

A. We are prepared to pay up to a maximum of 50 per cent of the universities' Indirect Costs but will only pay estate costs for placement of up to, and including, 6 months. Travel & Subsistence costs will also be paid subject to justification and approval.

Q. During the course of the placement will I be employed by the ESRC?

A. No. You will remain employed by your university and they will administer the award on your behalf. The ESRC will deal directly with your Finance Office.

Q. Will I have to attend an interview with the Partner organisation?

A. If they are happy with your application they will ask to meet you at interview. Someone from the ESRC will also attend the interview where possible.

Q. Who will line manage me during the placement?

A. The Partner will appoint someone to line manage you throughout the course of the placement but the ESRC will also assign someone as your 'case officer'.

Q. Will there be any special conditions whilst placed in a Partner organisation?

A. The Fellow will be expected to adhere to the ESRC's requirements of independence from political, commercial or sectional interest and will need to give an undertaking to respect a confidentiality agreement, specifying that data on policy advice and internal debate will be disclosed without prior written agreement of the host department.

Q. Will I still be able to honour my teaching commitments?

A. Yes. As long as the placement is for a minimum of 50 per cent of your time. However, this will be negotiable with the partner.

Q. At what stage in my career will I be eligible for the scheme?

A. We anticipate the successful applicant will have been involved in research for 1-5 years after completing their PhD. However, more senior researchers might be considered.

Q. How will my application be assessed?

A. Your applications will be assessed by two independent academic reviewers before being passed to the partner organisation for consideration for short-listing.

Q. Apart from the project, what else might I be required to do?

A. We hope that Fellows will offer seminars/workshops within their host partner organisation and across other organisations, where appropriate, on research methods in which they have expertise as well as sharing their project findings as they evolve.

Q. What reports am I required to produce?

A. In addition to the project report(s), we expect a report to be written at the conclusion of the project on the placement and another 12 months later reporting on the impact of the placement. (The host organisation will also be asked for their views at this time).

Q. Will Fellows have an opportunity to share their experiences?

A. Yes, during the placement period there will be at least one informal workshop to which all Fellows and those working with them will be invited.
